ADVERBS



Adverbs tell us **in what way someone does something**. Adverbs can modify verbs, adjectives or other adverbs.

adjective	adverb
Mandy is a careful girl .	Mandy drives carefully .
She is very careful .	She drives carefully .

Different types of adverbs include adverbs of

manner (*slowly*),

time (*yesterday*),

frequency (*often*) and

degree (*very*)

EXAMPLES:

Berhe walks *slowly*.

He came from town *yesterday*.

I *often* go to stadium on weekends.

Luwam runs *very* fast.

Adverbs of time

An **adverb of time** explains *when* something happens.

Adverbs of time answer the questions
When? and How long?

I went to the store **yesterday**.

In this sentence, **yesterday** is an *adverb of time*. It answers the question *When?*

Adverbs of time

Adverbs of time can describe *points in time*.

These adverbs are usually used at the beginning or the end of a sentence. They may contain more than one word.



now, presently, then, today, tomorrow, tonight,
yesterday, next week/month/year, last
week/month/year, this week/month/year...

If you want to emphasize the time, you can place the adverb at the beginning of the sentence.

Yesterday I went to the store.



PAST	PRESENT	FUTURE
yesterday	today	tomorrow
last week	this week	next week
an hour ago	now	in an hour
recently	as we speak	soon
a little while ago	at the moment	in the near future
a long time ago	these days	way off in the future
in the past	nowadays	eventually
this morning	at this time	later this evening

Examples

- My grandfather died a **long time ago**.
- They didn't sleep well **last night**.
- I will study that **tomorrow**.
- Don't worry Alexander, They will come **in an hour**.
- What are you going to do **tonight**?

- Maybe it'll take too long, but you will **eventually** make it.
- He was a good boy **in the past**.
- They will buy a new car **next month**.
- Will you finish your homework **today**?
- **This year**, everything will be very nice.

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Yet

Means something that we expected has happened or has not happened.

We usually put it at the end of a sentence.

EXAMPLE

- She hasn't watered the flowers **yet**.
- She hasn't finished her homework **yet**.

Already

Means something happened earlier than we expected.

EXAMPLE:

- She has **already** finished her homework.
- I have **already** seen the movie.

Just

A very short time ago.

EXAMPLE

She has **just** come from school.

I have **just** finished my homework.

still

Something is ongoing and hasn't finished.

Example:

The baby is **still** crying.

We are **still** learning about adverbs.
