 - (a) Truth is a naked and open day light, that doth not shew the masques and mummeries, and triumphs of the world, half so stately and daintily as candle-lights.
 - (b) Feuds of this nature, though too frequent in the country, are very fatal to the ordinary people! Who are so used to be dazzled with riches, that they pay as much difference to the understanding of a man of an estate, as of a man of learning, and are very hardly brought to regard any truth, how important, so ever it may be, that is preached to them, when they know there are several men of five hundred a year who do not believe it.

- (c) But I am weary of stringing up all my married acquaintance by Roman denominations. Let them amend and change their manners, or I promise to record the full-length English of their names, to the terror of all such desperate offenders in future.
- (d) Poet and Prophet differ greatly in our loose modern notions of them. In some old language, again, the titles are synonymous, vates means bothe Prophet and Poet : and indeed at all times.
