## Banking Recruitment Result Order (From 2026–27)

New sequence introduced by Ministry of Finance (DFS)

#### 1. Result Order

1. SBI Results
  2. Nationalized Banks (IBPS PO/Clerk) Results
  3. RRBs Results
- Officer → Clerk Order
- In every category, Officer-level results will be released first.
  - Clerk-level results will be released afterwards.

### Why This Change?

- Earlier, candidates kept shifting from RRB → Nationalized Banks → SBI, leading to high attrition.
- Banks were facing staff shortage and operational issues.
- With a fixed result order, candidates can set their preferences clearly, and banks will get stable manpower.

### Transparency Measures (From 2026–27)

- IBPS will provide response sheets and answer keys through login access.

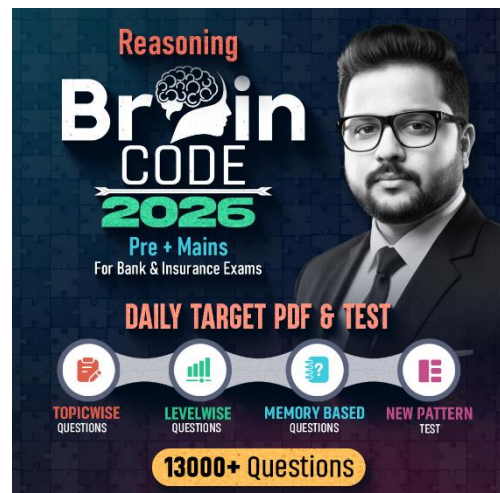

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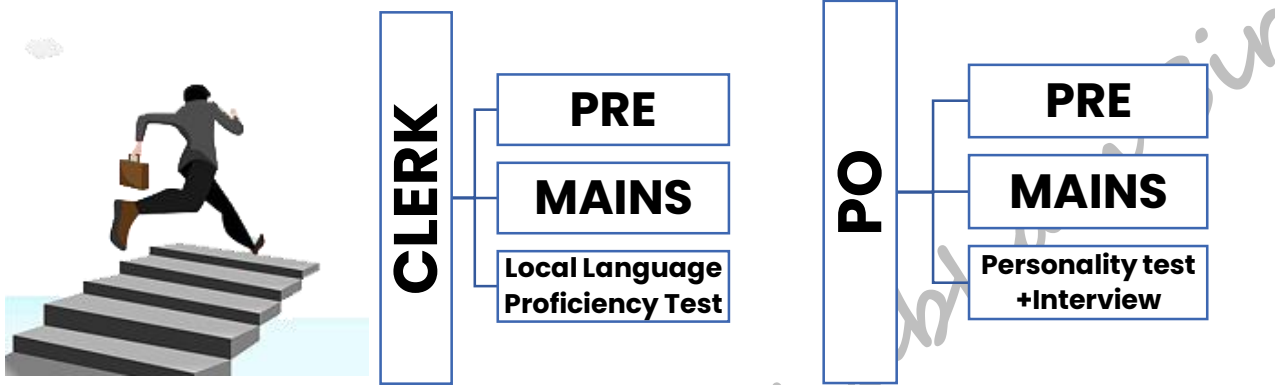
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### Banking Exam Stages

Usually, bank exams take place in two stages for clerical posts, and for officer-level posts (PO), it generally happens in three stages.

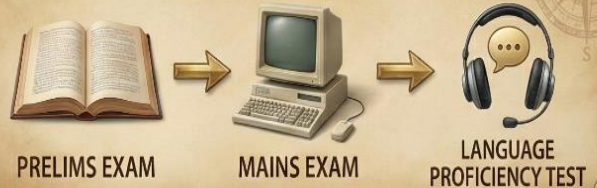

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### Exam Insights : What You Must Know



#### Educational Qualification

- **Mandatory:** A Graduation Degree in any discipline from a recognized University or any equivalent qualification recognized by the Central Government.
- **Final Year Students:** Candidates who are in the final year/semester of their graduation may also apply provisionally, provided they must produce proof of passing the degree before a specified date (usually before the date of the interview).
- **Minimum Percentage:** There is no minimum percentage of marks required in graduation to apply for the exam.

### Mains Exam

The mains examination is the final round when it comes to the clerical cadre. For the officer level, this stage marks 80% weightage for the final merit list (20% weightage of interview). This stage is also conducted online and is objective and subjective in nature. There are almost four sections: reasoning & computer aptitude, data analysis, English, and general awareness. There is a descriptive test as well, which is of 30 marks and of 30 minutes duration.

- **Sectional timing: Fixed time per section.**
- **Negative marking: 0.25 marks are deducted for each wrong answer.**
- Mains → **sectional cut-offs + overall performance**

**(i) Objective Test:** The objective test of 3 hours duration consists of 4 Sections of 170 questions for total 200 marks. The objective test will have separate timing for every section.

**(ii) Descriptive Test:** The Descriptive Test of 30 minutes duration with two questions for 50 marks will be a Test of English Language (Letter Writing & Essay).

#### Interview Process

A candidate who clears both the Prelims & Mains Exam of SBI PO 2025 will be further called for a GD-PI session wherein they will face a panel of selectors discussing their past experience and questions related to General

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Knowledge and of the Banking Sector. It is essential for a candidate to clear the Interview Process in order to ensure their final selection in the SBI PO 2025 Exam. The qualifying marks for this round will be decided by the Bank and the marks allotted to these rounds are: **Group Discussion – 20 marks, Interview – 30 marks.**

### Final Selection

After a candidate has gone through Personal Interviews, a merit list will be prepared by the State Bank of India wherein the candidate's score of the **Mains Exam and Interview Round will be taken into account.** Based on the score obtained by candidates and the available vacancies, final cut-off marks will be declared. All candidates who clear the cut-off range will be granted the Appointment Letter by State Bank of India for the post of Probationary Officer.

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### IBPS PO INTERVIEW

The candidates who have qualified for the mains exam are called for a face to face interview which carries a maximum of 100 marks. The minimum qualifying mark in the interview is 40% (35% for SC/ST/OBC/PWD candidates).

The interview round is generally 15-20 minutes long, where a panel of bank officials ask questions to the candidates about themselves, banking sector, current affairs, general awareness, etc. The candidates must be well dressed, confident and carry all required documents to the interview.

The final merit list is prepared based on marks obtained in the main examination and interview. The final score is calculated by IBPS with weightage of marks given to the main examination and interview in the ratio of 80:20 respectively.

### 3 Final Score Calculation for IBPS PO Exam

The final score for the IBPS PO exam is calculated keeping the following points in mind:

- Marks obtained in the Preliminary Exam (Tier-1) will not be considered in the final score and are only for qualifying to Mains Exam (Tier-2).
- Candidates must qualify for Phase-2 and Interview separately to be eligible for final merit.
- The weightage (ratio) of IBPS PO Main exam and interview for the final merit list will be 80:20 respectively.
- The aggregate score out of 100 is used for the final merit list for each category. Candidates with top merit rank in each category are finally selected.

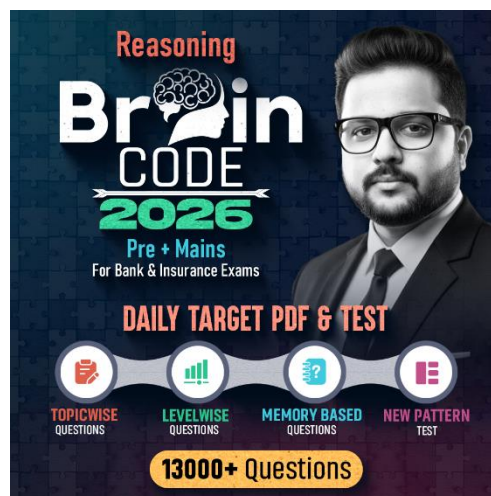

- **Mid-Day Focus (Noon & Afternoon):** This plan places the two most scoring and practice-intensive subjects—Reasoning (2.5–3 hours) and Quants (2.5–3 hours)—in two large, consecutive blocks. This works because your energy levels are typically highest in the late morning and early afternoon, allowing you to tackle these mentally demanding subjects with maximum efficiency.
- **Integrated Learning (Morning):** Combining GA/CA (passive reading) with English reading (active comprehension) uses your initial study time efficiently, easing you into the long day.

#### 2. The Power of Structure

- **Non-Negotiable Blocks:** For a plan of this length to work, each block must be treated as a firm appointment. Sticking to the time boundaries prevents subjects from bleeding into one another.

- **How it Works:** By placing 2 hours of Reasoning (the most logic-intensive subject) in the early morning, you utilize your **highest mental clarity** before your workday drains your energy. This ensures high efficiency and better retention.
- **The Sacrifice:** This requires a non-negotiable early bedtime and waking up significantly earlier than usual.

#### 2. Convert Passive Time into GA/CA Time

- **How it Works:** GA/CA is covered using **passive learning methods**—you don't need a desk or a pen. Use earphones during your commute, while eating lunch, or during any routine work task that doesn't require deep concentration.
- **The Key:** Download audio materials, news summaries, or monthly GA PDFs *before* the workday starts so they are ready for passive consumption.

#### 3. Dedicated High-Focus Evening Block (Quants)

- **How it Works:** This is your second main study block. The first two hours after arriving home (or after dinner/a short break) are dedicated entirely to Quants. This subject requires heavy computation, making a 2-hour focused block essential.

**Quiz/Analysis:** The 30-minute quiz serves as a powerful **closing mechanism**. It applies what you learned and gives you a sense of accomplishment, leading to better sleep and motivation for the next day.

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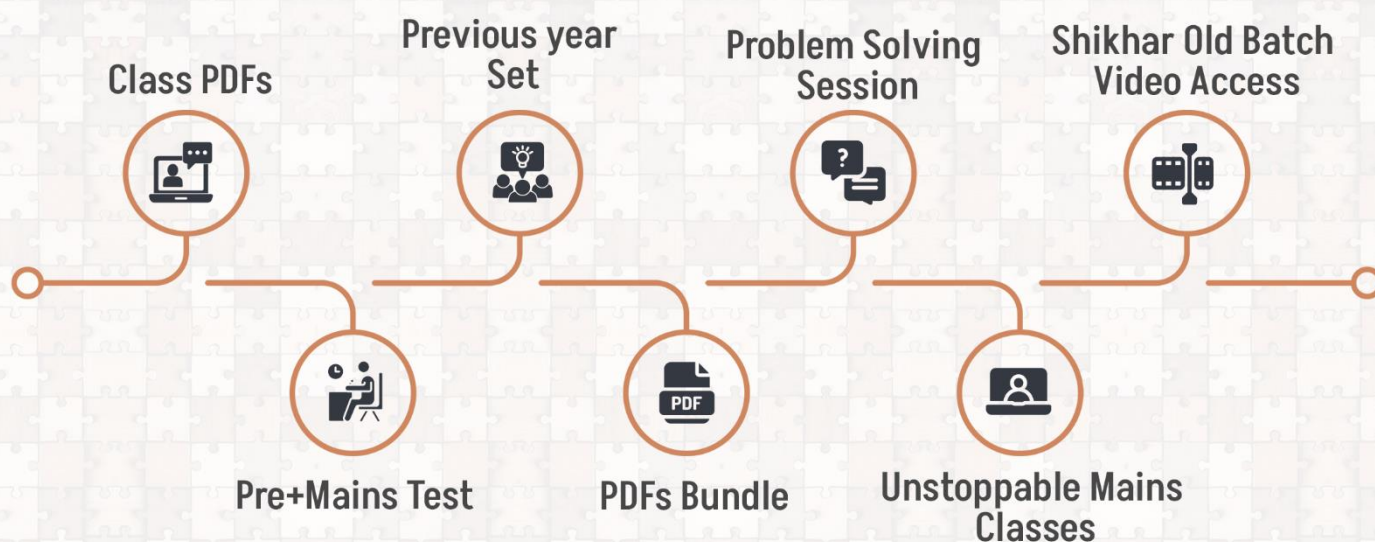

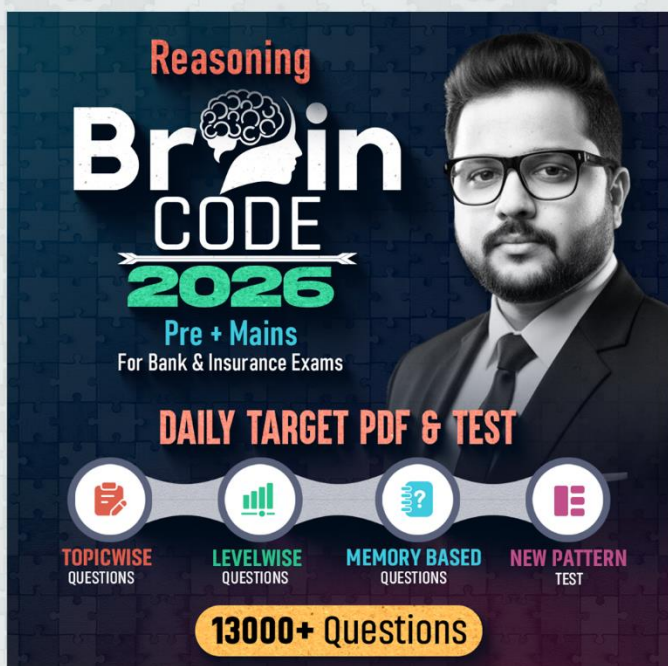
